### Department Commander – John Buckwalter

I want to begin by thanking you, the members of the Department of Missouri for your confidence and support in electing me as your Department Commander for 2024-2025. Building the Future Today: that was my campaign slogan and is my philosophy for this year. We just completed a very successful year. We finished the year with 26,569 members, which was only 400 members less than we began with. 95% of our members renewed. Our goal for 2025 is 27,459. I am confident that this is the year

we will exceed our goal.

What does building the future of the Department look like? We, the 26,569 members, are the Foundation. We are the base upon which we must grow-at the Post, Department, and National levels. We are the Legion. It is up to us, starting with those wearing blue caps, to grow our organization. We must each reach out and ask our fellow veterans to join the Legion. No one will join unless they are asked. I firmly believe that we need to grow to at least 30,000 members in the next 5 years if we are to continue the programs which define the American Legion.

Members are the foundation, and programs are the framework of our organization. We exist because of the four pillars of our organization: Americanism, Veterans, Defense, and Youth. We had many successes in our programs during 2024. We must support and grow our programs in 2025. Missouri Boys State had over 850 young men complete "A week to change a life" last year. Our goal for 2025 is 850 again. We held the first Cadet Patrol Class with the Missouri State Highway Patrol since COVID. We had 17 young men and women complete the class. Our goal for 2025 is a full class of 40 cadets. This program is so important to the Legion and to the State, that I have made it my Commander's project for 2025. In this edition of the Legionnaire you will see articles about Baseball, Oratorical Contests, Boys State, and other youth and Americanism programs. The Legion is working hard to support our members and all veterans through the Veteran Affairs and Rehabilitation programs. We have made a major investment in our Service Officer program and have recently added a service officer at the Columbia VA hospital. Along with the other members of MAVO (Missouri Association of Veterans Organizations) we will work with our State elected officials to advance legislation critical to Missouri's veterans, and to insure continued and consistent funding of the Missouri Veterans Commission. Legislative Chair Charley Goodin provides a legislative update in this *Legionnaire* and publishes an update on the missourilegion.org website.

If membership is the foundation, and programs are the framework, then publicity is the roof or "cover" of our Department. We must tell our story; we must let the public and potential members know what we do and what we stand for. Post newsletters are a vital tool in keeping members informed. Every Post should have an active public relations campaign. The Consolidated Post Report or CPR is our way of gathering the activities and accomplishment of the Legion into a single report to let Congress and the Nation know what we do. I expect every Post to submit a CPR this year. The new CPR can be completed online and can be started now and updated through the year before being submitted in June. I encourage Posts to prepare an annual Post history.

I look forward to a great year as your Commander. I have spent the first two months on the road it seems, having attended the National Membership Workshop, and accompanying the National Commander on his visit to Zone II. I will join Senor Vice Commander Goolsby and National Vice Commander Jim Kellogg for a visit to Zone IV starting September 26<sup>th</sup>. I hope to see many more posts in the next 10 months and meet as many of you as possible. We must build the future of our organization today. The Legion is too important to our communities, our state, and our nation to accept a continued decline. It is up to each of us to Build the Future of the Department of Missouri.





# **Legislative Chair Charley Goodin**

First get out and vote!! Do your job for democracy. Know your candidates and issues. Next please sign up for the legislative updates and Legislative Alerts. We are including a QR code that will take you to the sign up. Do it and follow the instructions. It is simple as ABC. When you get an email asking you to contact your legislators click on the link and send your message.

Secondly, closer to home affecting our Veterans Homes, Cemeteries, and VSO Grant Program is Constitutional Amendment No. 2. It allows sports betting online. All the proceeds, if any, go to education ONLY. This could have an adverse effect on attendance at Missouri Casinos. The attendance is where we get funds for the Missouri Veterans Commission. At the September Missouri Association of Veterans Organizations (MAVO) meeting it was voted to not to support Amendment No. 2 as written. MAVO will continue to advocate for a dedicated funding source (General Revenue) to support the Missouri Veterans Commission and all their priorities.

MAVO will once again gather at the capitol in January or February to present our legislative priorities to the General Assembly. Then in March or April we will have a rally with better weather and attendance which is necessary to show strong support for veteran's needs. We are requesting as many as possible to attend. # Why can't I renew online?

The American Legion approved a \$5.00 national dues increase at the 104th Annual Convention in 2023. That increase, which went into effect with the current, 2025 membership year, means that the per member fee which must be submitted with each renewal is \$37.50. That is the amount which must be submitted to the Department for mail in renewals by your Post, or which must be electronically transferred if your Post processes renewals online by MyLegion.org. Some Posts chose not to increase dues for 2025, either consciously to help members, or simply because they did not take action soon enough to meet the April deadline for adjusting dues. It is up to each Post to establish their dues, and if a Post chooses to use Post resources to cover the dues shortfall that is permitted. However, a member of a post whose dues are less than \$37.50 cannot renew online. New members cannot join an upsidedown Post online either. The system cannot accept payment less than the billed amount. Any membership transactions by an upside-down Post must be done through the Post using paper transmittals, the old-fashioned way.

It is strongly recommended that upside-down Posts take action this year to increase their dues to at least \$37.50 plus any Post portion and any District per capita that may be assessed. It is suggested that the minimum dues for a Post in the Department of Missouri be set at \$40. Dues can be adjusted during the year by submitting a new Post Data Report adjusting the dues amount. National will update the Posts dues, and future dues notices will reflect the new amount. Alternatively, your Post can update the annual dues on the Post Data Report submitted in April2025, adjusting the Dues for the 2026 membership year, knowing they must process the rest of the 2025 renewals by mail.

- 1. Study and Learn about Veterans' Benefits Programs:
  - a. Read thoroughly VA's Federal Benefits for Veterans, Dependents and Survivors. https://www.va.gov/opa/publications/benefits book/2021 Federal Benefits for Veterans Dependents and survivors.pdf
  - b. Attend local Veterans Service Seminars and Veterans events.
  - c. Attend and/or organize American Legion Veterans Service Seminars or events (training and presentations can be requested through the Department Service Officer - DSO).
  - d. Work with your closest accredited representatives to make connections for veteran/claimants.
  - e. Communicate with the Department Service Officers when veterans' benefits questions arise.
  - f. Read and share with Post members, information from Veterans Service Organizations articles.
  - g. Become a VA volunteer! <a href="https://www.volunteer.va.gov/">https://www.volunteer.va.gov/</a>
- 2. Get Materials to Help Inform Claimants about VA benefits and Other Topics
  - a. Offer information about filing claims to your Post and/or District members.
  - b. Offer information about filing claims to other veterans in your communities.
  - c. Visit Post and District members when they are hospitalized and let them know if they might be entitled to Compensation or Pension benefits.
  - d. Help claimants obtain evidence to support their claims.
  - e. Let the County Veteran Service Officer know who you are and offer your assistance.
  - f. Always work with an accredited representative
  - g. Do NOT take "claim" paperwork on behalf of a veteran or claimant. Use the interview sheet.
  - h. Empower the claimant to work with accredited representative closest to them or by remote means, such as fax, phone and email.
- 3. Help Develop and promote veterans' Legislative issues:
  - a. Listen to concerns about veteran's service / benefits issues and develop ideas for solutions.
  - b. Help Post develop veterans' benefits resolutions to present to their District and the Department.
  - c. Keep Post informed about the importance of "grass roots" legislative issues.
  - d. Communicate the Legion's mission and programs to elected public officials when necessary.
- 4. Discuss the importance of membership at every gathering in which you attend and to veterans outside the Post you may assist or advise.

Greetings to the American Legion Family.

My first year as the ALR director has been a new learning experience for me. It was a challenge, but I survived it with the help of some of the greatest people in the Missouri American Legion and the rider program. We truly are one big family.

In June the ALR did the annual Legacy Ride and raised \$60,892. During last year's fall conference, the ALR program voted to keep some of the monies raised in Missouri to the Missouri Foundation (25%) and the rest donated to the National Foundation of Hope (Veterans and Children's Foundation)(75%). \$15,223 to Missouri and \$45.669 to National. During the National Legacy Ride, which started in Independence, MO and ended in New Orleans at the National Convention, an additional \$10,000 was given to the National Commander at the start of the ride. That was included in our donation to national and that brought our donation to \$55.669. Thank you to all Legion family members who supported this endeavor. (continues of page 8)
